



## OTHER ACTIVITIES AROUND KAZIRANGA

- a. **Tee at Kaziranga:** The Kaziranga Golf Resort is a tea-tee that has been developed in the middle of a tea estate in Jorhat. Designed by one of India's leading golf course architect, the resort has a challenging 18-hole, par-71 golf course that is the first of its kind. The club house is the Heritage Burra Sahib's Bungalow. The resort also has a golf academy with professional coaching and a well-equipped golf pro shop.
- b. Visit to a Tea Garden and Tea Factory.
- c. Visit to a nearby Mishing or a Karbi village.
- d. Enjoy Cultural show in the evening.



## HOW TO REACH

Kaziranga is well connected to Guwahati, the State capital (239 km.) and Jorhat (96 km) which in turn, are well connected to the rest of the country by regular flights from Delhi and Kolkata. Furkating junction (75 km) is the nearest railhead. Regular bus services run both by the Assam State Transport Corporation and by Private agencies are available throughout the day to and from Guwahti and Jorhat to Kohora (Kaziranga).



## WHEN TO VISIT

The best time to visit the Park is from November to April. The Park remains closed from May 1 to the end of October due to floods.

## THE WILD POPULATION

One-horned rhinoceros, Elephant, Indian bison, Swamp deer, Sambhar, Hog deer, Sloth bear, Tiger, Leopard, Cat, Jungle Cat, Hog Badger, Capped Langur, Hoolock gibbon, Buffalo and Birds like Pelican, duck, Geese, Hornbill, Ibis, Cormorant, Egret, Heron, Black necked stork, Lesser adjutants, Ring-tailed fishing eagles etc. are plenty in the National Park.



## SIGHTSEEING IN KAZIRANGA

Tourists can enter the National Park either on elephant back or in a jeep. While elephant rides are possible only from Mihimukh in the Central Range and from Bagori in the Western Range, jeep safaris are possible in all the three ranges, including the Eastern Range from Agaratoli. Both jeep safaris and elephant rides are possible in the mornings and early evenings when the animals are most active. It is mandatory for tourists to ensure that a Forest Department's guide accompanies them.

Since there is only limited facility for elephant rides it is advisable that prior reservations are made.



**K**aziranga National Park, a World Heritage site of 860 square kilometres of grass and forest land in the lap of the mighty Brahmaputra river is the refuge for the world's largest population of Great One-horned Rhinoceros and is a symbol of pride and culture for the people of Assam. Kaziranga also has the highest density of tigers in the World. The fame of this Park has crossed over the boundaries of the Indian subcontinent and has succeeded in attracting the attention of people all over the world. A visit to Kaziranga is an experience of a lifetime with nature. And for those who are yet to visit Kaziranga, a dream awaits them to experience the rolling expanses of wild grasslands with all its animals, birds and flowers. The precious and rare ecosystem of this National Park, stretching from Bokakhat in the East to Jakhlabandha in the West is protected like a fortress by the Eastern Himalayan ranges on the North and by the ranges of the Garo, Khasi, jaintia, Mikir, Cachar and Barail hills to the South.
